



수궁가 Sugungga, Song of the Water Palace, is one of the 오바탕 Obatang, the five canonical songs of the pansori tradition. The story is an allegory of survival of the weak amidst the powerful. According to the Confucian worldview, the weak or subjugated are to sacrifice themselves for their betters. The supreme ruler of all watery realms, the Dragon King, has fallen alarmingly ill, and no doctor or medicine can cure him. A mystic healer divines his only cure: the liver of a wild mountain hare. Who will venture to Land for the hare that will save the King?



Chan E. Park

Biography of Chan E. Park

Chan E. Park is Professor Emeritus of Korean literature and performance in the Department of East Asian Languages and Literatures at the Ohio State University. Park's literary work is informed by her training in theater and 국악 or traditional performance. She studied under the late Master Chung Kwonjin, National Preserver of the Gangsanche Boseong tradition of pansori. The monograph *Korean Pansori as Voice Theatre: History, Theory, Practice* (Methuen Forms of Drama Series, Bloomsbury, 2024) is among her most recent publications. For performance presentations, she renders archaic pansori text through original translations to be accessible to audiences around the world.



KEYNOTE ADDRESS PRESENTED BY JOHN P. BURNS

Authoritarian Shocks: Centralizing Control in and over Hong Kong since 2020

Post-1997, when China resumed sovereignty over Hong Kong, the territory did not drift back toward hard authoritarianism. Rather, the transition in 2020 from soft to relatively hard was sudden, sharp, a major rift with the recent past—a shock. It caught many in Hong Kong unaware. The change has had an outsized impact on the young. It crushed, chewed up, and spat out many lives as authorities settled scores and reminded Hong Kongers who is in charge. The speed of the changes also surprised the hundreds of thousands who for decades participated in peaceful protest and voted in elections that mattered. The speed with which the political class accommodated and apparently enthusiastically embraced the changes also shocked many.

The case of Hong Kong, now stuck in a halfway house between soft and hard authoritarianism, demonstrates the utility of viewing authoritarianism as practice. I examine the significance, process, impact, and likely outcome of China centralizing power in and over Hong Kong in the wake of widespread increasingly violent social protest in 2019.

Biography of John P. Burns

John P. Burns is Emeritus Professor and Honorary Professor of Politics and Public Administration of the University of Hong Kong, where he has taught for forty years. He served as Chair Professor of Politics and Public Administration from 1996-2017 and Dean of Faculty of Social Sciences from 2011-2017. He obtained undergraduate degrees from St. Olaf College and the University of Oxford, and a Ph.D. in political science from Columbia University. He specializes in the politics of China focusing on political selection and civil service management and reform. He has consulted for the Asian Development Bank, the OECD, the United Nations Development Programme and the World Bank, where his work focused on governance and administrative reform in China. He is the author or editor of eight books, and his academic articles have appeared in scholarly journals such as *The China Quarterly, Journal of Contemporary China, Pacific Affairs, and Public Administration and Development.* His op-eds have appeared in *The Diplomat, Global Asia, Ming Pao,* and the *Hong Kong Free Press,* where he has his own page (https://www.hongkongfp.com/author/johnburns/). He has appeared on Al Jazeera, BBC, Bloomberg, Channel News Asia, CNN, and Sky News, and has been widely quoted in media such as the *New York Times, CNN, the Guardian, LA Times, Nikkei Asia,* and local media in Hong Kong.

Food and Gendered Life Politics in Global Korea

In 2019, in the context of my long-term project on American women missionaries in Korea at the turn of the twentieth century, I came across a curious little book: *The Art of Korean Cooking* (1945/1959) by Harriett Morris, an American Protestant missionary and a professor of home economics in Korea (1921-1940). This serendipitous encounter set me off on a continuous stream of questions about gender and domesticity in the context of the transpacific flow of people, ideas, and materials, and the impact of the intersecting forces of modernity, colonialism, the Cold War, and globalization. In this presentation, I will share some food stories experienced and narrated by ordinary women whose lives and work shed new light on existing and emerging gender dynamics in the context of geopolitical, economic, and cultural changes. In doing so, I aim to illustrate how the most intimate and mundane practices of cooking and eating provide a useful vantage point from which one can examine the confluence of the private, public, and global.

Chinese Theater Collaborative (CTC): Writing for Public-Facing, Open-Access Digital Humanities



Workshop Description: The 'Chinese Theater Collaborative (CTC) Writing for Public-Facing, Open-Access Digital Humanities' pre-conference session introduces participants to CTC's publicfacing editorial format in order for them to become published, individually acknowledged contributors to the site. An extension of two recent student-facing academic publications, How To Read Chinese Drama (Columbia University Press, 2022) and How To Read Chinese Drama in Chinese (Columbia University Press, 2023), our site introduces the manifold afterlives of classical Chinese theater as stage adaptations, film, television, comics, and other media in the Chinese-speaking world and the world at large in a visually attractive and intellectually engaging manner.

During the workshop, participants will develop their idea for a 'module' about an adaptation of their choice for eventual publication on the Scalar-based CTC site. Currently, the site features 24 modules (2,500 to 3,000 words) on 6 iconic plays, namely The Orphan of Zhao, Top Graduate Zhang Xie, The Story of the Western Wing, The Lute, Mulan, and Peony Pavilion. By the end of 2024, we will also have uploaded an additional 6-8 modules devoted to the plays of Guan Hanqing.



Landing a Tenure-Track Job in the U.S.

Workshop Description: Tenure track jobs are becoming harder and harder to get. Making yourself stand out on the job market is essential but what exactly are employers looking for? What can you do now to make sure your application rises to the top? In this workshop, we will talk about the nature of the current job market and focus on how to make sure you're ready. We'll critique cover letters and CVs, practice interviewing, and discuss what made me stand out in a crowded market to land a VAP directly out of graduate school in 2018 and a tenure track position a year later. Utilizing my experience serving on and chairing multiple search committees, I'll share what committees are really looking for and how to bring that front and center in your materials and interviews.

Navigating the Path to Publication: Your Conference Paper Reworked

Workshop Description: Conference sessions are fine venues for presenting one's academic work in progress or engaging with critiques from like-minded scholars, but presenting one's manuscript is often only an early step on the path to publication. In this pre-conference session, participants will have an additional opportunity to not only present their work to a friendly academic environment, but also refine their writing with future journal submissions in mind, including to gauge the scope of intended journals to submit, or to select relevant journals

in the field. This session will open with a talk and discussion on preparing a focused, well-presented manuscript for submission to journal editors. Following that, each participant will present their paper (up to 20 minutes), followed by a Q&A session (15-20 minutes) aimed at developing or clarifying their ideas for an audience of their peers.

Navigating Insider/Outsider Dynamics in Fieldwork for Early-Career Scholars

Workshop Description: This full day workshop offers a practical space for 30 early-career scholars to explore the epistemological and methodological challenges that arise during fieldwork. Using an interpretivist lens, participants will engage in discussions about how epistemic limitations, access, and agency influence their research design and implementation. The aim is to foster deeper methodological adeptness, enabling researchers to adapt to the socio-political complexities of their field sites. By the end of the workshop, participants will have reflected on their research methodologies to develop a more critical understanding of their research questions and assumptions. Additionally, they will leave with an "edited" methods page and a master document that synthesizes key insights from each workshop section, which they can use as a reference for their ongoing research. The workshop is designed to be interactive and practical, helping participants prepare for or reflect on their own fieldwork experiences, with opportunities for networking and peer feedback.

Reimagining Japanese Studies in the 21st century via Digital Humanities Internships: The JapanLab Experiment at UT Austin

Workshop Description: A short workshop led by Dr. Jessa Dahl (Assistant Professor, Knox College; previously Post-doctoral fellow at UT Austin) and Kirsten Cather (Associate Professor, University of Texas at Austin) sharing our experiences developing JapanLab at the University of Texas at Austin. Started in 2022 with generous support from the Japan Foundation and the College of Liberal Arts at UT, JapanLab is a Digital Humanities & Japanese Studies initiative that seeks to generate a steady stream of Japanfocused educational video games and other DH content designed by undergraduate students for free distribution to teachers and students across the world. At the core of the JapanLab program are small teams of undergraduates who work for a semester alongside a faculty member to design a range of projects that include fully functional video games like Ghosts over the Water, Palace of Poetry, and The Censor's Desk, digital games like Ready, Set, Yokohama and Sumoroku, online exhibits like Mapping Violence, and virtual cities like Crafting Yokohama. Our presentation will discuss the challenges and successes we have encountered, from the logistics of the initial grant-writing process and establishing the program to the core internship undergraduate experience.





Excursion to the UNESCO World Heritage Sites at the Ohio Hopewell Ceremonial Earthworks

"Where Earth Meets Sky": Eight Ohio Hopewell Ceremonial Earthworks were inscribed by UNESCO as World Heritage Sites in 2023, making them the 26th property in the United States and the first and only UNESCO site in the state of Ohio to be recognized as "sites of universal value." The Earthworks are complex masterpieces of landscape architecture, geometrically precise and aligning with the cycles of the sun and moon. They were constructed by communities of American Indians who gathered at these places to worship and to connect with each other. This excursion will visit two of the sites, the Great Circle Earthworks and the Octagon Earthworks, with guided tours by Dr. John Low, director for the Newark Earthworks Center. A lunch, overlooking the Octagon Earthworks, will be served. Authoritarian Shocks: Centralizing Control in and over Hong Kong since 2020

Hilton, Aminah Robinson Grand Ballroom, 5th Floor 5:00 PM-6:30 PM

Post-1997, when China resumed sovereignty over Hong Kong, the territory did not drift back toward hard authoritarianism. Rather, the transition in 2020 from soft to relatively hard was sudden, sharp, a major rift with the recent past—a shock. It caught many in Hong Kong unaware. The change has had an outsized impact on the young. It crushed, chewed up, and spat out many lives as authorities settled scores and reminded Hong Kongers who is in charge. The speed of the changes also surprised the hundreds of thousands who for decades participated in peaceful protest and voted in elections that mattered. The speed with which the political class accommodated and apparently enthusiastically embraced the changes also shocked many.

The case of Hong Kong, now stuck in a halfway house between soft and hard authoritarianism, demonstrates the utility of viewing authoritarianism as practice. I examine the significance, process, impact, and likely outcome of China centralizing power in and over Hong Kong in the wake of widespread increasingly violent social protest in 2019.

In 2019, in the context of my long-term project on American women missionaries in Korea at the turn of the twentieth century, I came across a curious little book: The Art of Korean Cooking (1945/1959) by Harriett Morris, an American Protestant missionary and a professor of home economics in Korea (1921-1940). This serendipitous encounter set me off on a continuous stream of questions about gender and domesticity in the context of the transpacific flow of people, ideas, and materials, and the impact of the intersecting forces of modernity, colonialism, the Cold War, and globalization. In this presentation, I will share some food stories experienced and narrated by ordinary women whose lives and work shed new light on existing and emerging gender dynamics in the context of geopolitical, economic and cultural changes. In doing so, I aim to illustrate how the most intimate and mundane practices of cooking and eating provide a useful vantage point from which one can examine the confluence of the private, public, and global.

Food also helps us understand the mobility of people, ideas, and materials across time and space. Food cultures have been shaped and transformed by this mobility and the particular historical contexts in which they emerge. This panel takes food as a useful lens for understanding global Asias from interdisciplinary, transnational and planetary perspectives.

Please join us for an excursion to view a Dunhuang Scroll and to explore imperial treasures and the exhibition Mobility, Collecting, and Diaspora: Preserving and Teaching East Asian History on campus at The Ohio State University. The exhibition explores rare and unique works from various campus collections (e.g., the Rare Books & Manuscripts Library, Jerome Lawrence and Robert E. Lee Theatre Research Institute, and the Bliss M. and Mildred A. Wiant Collection of Chinese Art). The excursion will begin at the Wexner Center for the Arts with a private viewing of an eighth-century calligraphic scroll from the Mogao Library Cave in Dunhuang, China, a Qi Baishi fan painting, and a Qianlong ceramic bowl, all part of the Bliss and Mildred Wiant Collection. These examples and the works on display at Thompson Library demonstrate how remarkable objects are collected and move between cultures, gathering unique histories that culminate in their arrival at the university for study and exploration. Centered on topics of performance, tradition, creativity and innovation, the exhibition includes overprinted books, an 18th-century Korean text, tea house models, painting, prints, rank badges, theatrical displays, calligraphy, musical instruments, and much more.
